Directions:

This lesson takes approximately 45 minutes to teach in this order:

- Review the PowerPoint presentation
- Play the sorting mat scenario game
- Complete a coloring page or worksheet of your choice

POWERPOINT:

This presentation teaches all about sportsmanship and how to be a team player. First, students will hear a story about a boy named Henry who struggles with making unkind and disrespectful choices on the soccer field. With the help of his teammates and coach, he learns an important lesson about sportsmanship, and how being a team player is even more important than winning. Then, students learn what sportsmanship means and practical ways they can be a good sport and positive team member. Two opportunities for turn and talk are included in which students can share with a neighbor sitting next to them, and/or with the class.

POSTER:

The sportsmanship poster serves as a nice review on how to be a good sport. You can go through it with students after the PowerPoint presentation, and/or display it in your space!

Directions:

SORTING GAME:

Materials Needed: sorting game mat, cut out scenario cards

After the PowerPoint presentation, I recommend playing the sorting mat game with students. Both full color and black/white materials are included. First, please print the sorting mat and scenario cards. Next, cut out the scenario cards. If you are using this activity with a large group of students, I recommend projecting the materials onto a screen or smart board. To play, students take turns grabbing a scenario card and reading it to the class (or the educator can read it aloud). Then, the student decides if the scenario shows a "good sport" choice or a "poor sport" choice. If the scenario shows a "good sport" choice, they can place it on the left side of the mat that says, "good sport." If the scenario shows a "poor sport" choice, they can place it on the right side of the mat that says, "poor sport." Feel free to generate discussions with students about the scenarios and relate them back to their own lives.
